


Social Inequality in the U.S.

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Inequality and Intersectionality

- Social Inequality:

 Identities exist in
 hierarchies, providing
 advantages and
 disadvantages that are
 interconnected
- Intersectionality: The way in which different axes of identity shape an individual's relationship with power



Understanding Poverty

- ♦ Poverty: A condition of deprivation due to economic circumstances severe enough that the individual cannot live with dignity in society
- ♦ The current poverty line for a U.S. family of 4 (2 children) is \$22,162
 - > The U.S. cost of living is \$35,000 \$50,000 depending on location
 - The difference is a cause of debate and tension
 - About 15% of people in the U.S. and25% of those in Oswego live in poverty




Poverty and Discrimination

- Poverty is a form of social inequality that is the result of structural conditions within a society
- A contributing factor to poverty is discrimination based on intersections of identities such as race, class, gender, religion, and sexuality

Causes and Consequences

- High rates of poverty in the U.S. are linked to:
 - Concentration of wealth
 - Uneven distribution of social capital or non-tangible resources individuals can access in times of need
 - Discrimination against certain groups
 - Stereotypes about the poor
